
Tuesday 25th September


Weekday in Ordinary Time

Today's Gospel – Luke 9:1-6

'The Christ of God' he said. But he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone anything about this.

'The Son of Man' he said 'is destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes and to be put to death, and to be raised up on the third day.'
